CAPITAL CONSTRUCTION UPDATE



Design of the Rainier Ave S/S 113th Watermain Replacement project progresses as easements needed for the project have been requested from residents.

This project, located east of Rainier Ave S near S 113th St replaces ~1,250 linear feet of 6-inch asbestos cement pipe and 2-inch galvanized pipe with new 8-inch ductile iron pipe and replaces existing water service lines, valves and fire hydrants. Construction is planned for 2025/2026. The project is funded in part by a 20-year low-interest Public Works Assistance Account (PWAA) loan from the Department of Commerce.



Construction of the 80th Avenue South Sewer Extension project by R.L. Alia began on January 6th and is complete. Minor restoration and project closeout remain to be done.

Sewer main lines and stubs along 80th Ave S and S 126th St are complete. Seven (7) properties within the project area connected to sewer and their onsite septic systems (OSS) were decommissioned. In addition to side sewer and OSS work, this project included construction of ~850 linear feet of new sewer main along 80th Avenue South from the 12800 block, north across Renton Avenue South, and continuing a short distance past the intersection at South 126th Street. This project is funded in part by a \$985,000 grant from the King County Climate Equity Pool, administered by the Public Health Equitable Wastewater Futures program. Construction of the First Cities Pump Station Pump Replacement project by Gary Harper Construction, Inc. began on February 18th and is complete, and project closeout is in progress.

The project is located in the Martin Luther King Jr Way S right-of-way and the work included replacement of two existing sewer pumps and associated pipes and valves; traffic control; removal and disposal of existing pumps, pipes, and valves; installation of new pumps, piping and valves; temporary by-pass pump installation; installation of temporary and permanent fencing; and restoration.

Boathouse Inc Renton Skyway Cleanup

We previously reported that operations at the former Ken's Skyway Cleaners dry cleaning facility at 12548 Renton Ave S resulted in the release of hazardous chemicals to soil and groundwater. Ongoing water quality testing shows that the District's drinking water supply has not been impacted by this contamination.

Department of Ecology (DOE) is providing funding for site cleanup through their Affordable Housing Cleanup Grant Program.

As this issue goes to print, the owner has completed planned work for the Remedial Investigation. Data indicated that some additional information was needed to fully delineate the extent of contamination. Once the well needed to collect additional data is installed and the data collected, the next step of preparing the draft Remedial Investigation report can be completed.

(Third in a series following the July issue.)

In previous issues, we provided a brief introduction to the Cascade Water Alliance (CWA), its members including Skyway, and the organization's mission of ensuring long-term water supply reliability and flexibility.

One of the first things CWA did after it was formed was to purchase water from Seattle Public Utilities (SPU) for its members. The original 2003 contract was amended several times and now provides water to CWA members until the amount begins to decline in 2039. Looking to the future, in 2009 Cascade purchased the Lake Tapps Reservoir as a future source of water supply and in 2010 secured water rights to use the reservoir as a source of drinking water, providing supply certainty and flexibility.

CWA's original goal was to develop Lake Tapps Reservoir for delivery of drinking water in 2042, after the water supply from SPU starts to decline. To meet that timeline, planning for construction of a water treatment facility and pipes to deliver the water would need to begin today. In 2021, CWA knew there was ample water supply in the region through at least 2060 and saw an opportunity to delay development of the Lake Tapps Reservoir by purchasing available regional supplies. This would provide significant financial and environmental benefits by using available regional water before developing new supplies.
